- **Improves Outcomes for Children:** There is a direct link between well-trained educators and positive developmental outcomes in children. The more the educators grow and learn, the more the children can do.


- **Builds Professional Confidence:** Staying informed and competent helps educators feel more confident and motivated in their roles.

Educator Spotlight



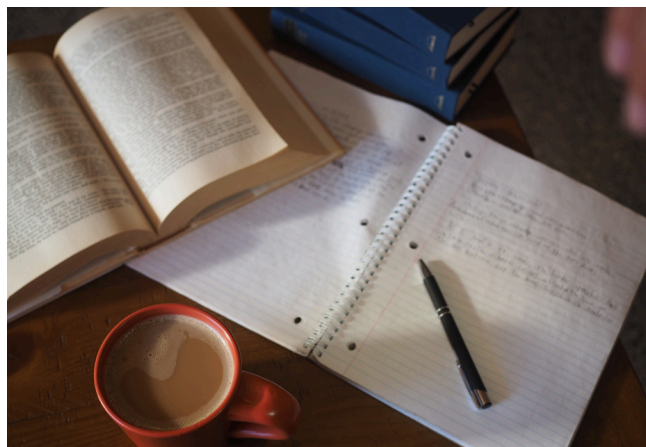
Shannon Lavin
